MISSION AND HISTORY

NYP CityServe was officially launched in the fall of 2014 as a Gospel-driven movement that identifies, develops, and nurtures church-connected, neighborhood-focused collaborations throughout the boroughs of NYC. Collaborative efforts focus on areas of justice, mercy and education. NY CityServe is an extension of the Portland CityServe model – a unifying movement of the evangelical churches in Portland, Oregon, to love and serve their city in the name of Christ by working with the Mayor's office and civic and cultural leaders to profoundly impact public schools, hunger and poverty, human trafficking, and the foster care system.





n response to "The Portland Story," local church leaders in the NYC region initiated talks to explore a partnership between area churches and LPA to establish and develop NY CityServe. These energized NYC leaders began meeting with LPA President Kevin Palau, who had spearheaded the vision for CityServe Portland in 2008.

For several months and in every borough, Kevin made repeated trips to NYC to listen to local church and civic leaders and to gauge the needs and interests of their communities. As a direct result of Kevin's diligence and prayer, LPA hired Chris Troy as the Director of NY CityServe to work with local leaders and flesh out the vision and mission.

Chris' first effort was to form the local leadership team that would define the mission and focus of NY CityServe. The NY CityServe Leadership Team consists of 13 borough-based leaders (mostly pastors), 8 Citywide leaders (i.e. Young Life, CRU, Salvation Army, etc.), and 11 Focus Area leaders (Justice, Mercy and Education). Chris and Co-Chairs Robert Guerrero and Althea Taylor worked together with the entire committee on fully developing the NY CityServe mission and value statements, as well as the funding guidelines (see Appendices A, B).

Once leaders had established the mission and values statements and thus developed their local voice, they began to work on fleshing out the Portland CityServe vision with a New York City feel, touch and context.

Values Statement

"NY CityServe is rooted in the biblical values of justice, mercy, humility, unity and love to be practiced through collaborative projects (goals) celebrating the diversity of God's movement in NYC, in order to seek the peace of the city for the glory of God."

Justice that addresses the needs of the poor and oppressed

Mercy that brings hope to those without hope


Humility that respects diversity and includes others

Integrity that is transparent and accountable

Unity that is collaborative

Collaboration:

NY CityServe has emphasized coming together in unity in the spirit of John 17; and engaging in activities related to justice, mercy and education as described by Jesus in Matthew 25:31-46. Much like in the book of Nehemiah, each collaborative group works on rebuilding the walls in their community to strengthen the fabric of the whole city. Since the spring of 2014, twenty-three church-connected, neighborhood-focused collaborations have emerged across the city. These collaborations have created greater Kingdom impact in areas of Justice, Mercy and Education. Each of these groups come together out of a shared love for Christ, their neighbors, and their community; and a commitment to building shared relationships, actions, and outcomes. These twenty-three collaborative efforts involve of over 300 churches and ministry organizations (see Appendix D).

Pattern for Church Collaboration

Sixteen of the 23 collaborative groups began as a direct result of NY CityServe and the seven pre-existing collaborations; five grew in size (number of churches engaged), efforts initiated, and energy developed to be a "Matthew 25 Catalyst." In the remaining two groups there has been no measurable change.

Most of the new groups are still in the relationship formation stage, while others are in the planning stage—mapping their assets to be used collaboratively and gauging their strategy with the assistance of NY CityServe. NY CityServe has provided encouragement, system data (schools, crimes, housing, contacts), and a collaborative asset-mapping survey to assist the groups in their planning process. In some cases we have provided introductions to schools and city officials. Officials from the Mayor's office, Controller's office, and NYPD regularly participate in many of the neighborhood collaborative meetings.

Early outcomes of NY CityServe efforts reveal that ten new school partnerships have been launched through these church-connected, neighborhood-focused collaborations. In addition, another eight partnerships are in the pipeline for the fall of 2015. These mentoring and tutoring programs provide an in-school to after-school continuum of relationships between students, families, and the schools.











School Partnerships & Service:

School partnerships have been spawned through the NY CityServe school partnership committee NYC School Partners (SchoolPartners.nyc), 20/20 Vision for Schools (2020Schools.org), various ministry organizations throughout NYC, and the leaders of neighborhood collaborations for NY CityServe. An exciting picture is emerging of growing numbers of church-connected service projects in neighborhood schools! As mentioned here, there are currently ten school partnerships launched by our church-connected neighborhood collaborations and another eight in the pipeline. NYC School Partnerships and 20/20 were helpful in guiding three of the group launches and are working closely with one of the groups in the pipeline. In addition, they have helped to develop partnerships within schools with Youth for Christ, Young Life, and New Canaan Society (NCS).

In addition to these school partnerships that provide mentoring, tutoring, and a variety of performing arts and sports programs, NYC School Partnerships has catalyzed 47 service projects throughout the five boroughs. Among these are eight school mural projects involving volunteers from churches throughout the city.

Loving Our Neighbor:

On March 28th 500 volunteers from Nyack College and 400 churches came together to love and serve their neighbors at ten sites located in every borough: with three in Brooklyn, one in Manhattan, and two each in Queens, Staten Island, and the Bronx. Volunteers served at family and women's shelters, after-school programs, preschool sites, and two city parks. Six of the ten sites were from our Salvation Army partners. Volunteers served in some of the highest need neighborhoods of our city such as Morrisania, Brownsville, and Bedford-Stuyvesant. Together this united effort aided 170 homeless families, 200 homeless women, over 800 pre-K children and youth. The countless families who use the parks worked together painting and cleaning in Brownsville and the South Bronx!

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As a result of this effort and the feedback we received from the sites we served, Nyack and the churches involved are planning on doing another Loving Our Neighbor on October 3rd.



Trafficking & Domestic Violence:

Through the efforts of Not On My Watch! (www.nycclergyroundtable.org), nine churches throughout the city are engaged in training both clergy and laity on ways to intervene and minister to those who are caught up in sex trafficking or who are victims of domestic violence. These nine churches also will increase the number of Safe Haven Churches (ministering to those who are victims of sex trafficking and domestic violence) by 25 over the course of the next year. This will create an army of 225 churches who will stand together and sound a strong alarm to perpetrators of trafficking and domestic violence: together they declare Not On My Watch!

Grants:

As of June 19, NY CityServe has distributed 24 grants totaling \$100,612.00 to ministries focusing on justice, mercy, and education. We anticipate another \$60,000.00 in grants being distributed before the end of 2015 *(see Appendix E).*

NEXT STEPS AND GOALS

Based on developments over the past year, NY CityServe is working on the following objectives for the upcoming year.


- Collaborations: We will continue to identify, develop, and nurture church-connected, neighborhood-focused collaborations. In particular we will work on developing new collaborations in Queens (already working with churches in Corona, Queens) and CD1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 in the South Bronx. In addition, NY CityServe will continue to accelerate greater church-connected, neighborhood-focused action in the current collaborations. We will assist groups in both planning and implementing collaborative actions in their communities.
- 2. School Partnership: Continue to expand the number of both school service projects and partnerships. Support the eight new collaborations and encourage them to start their school partnerships in the fall of 2015.
- **3. Foster Care:** Work with the Federation of Protestant Welfare Agencies (FPWA) to motivate, mobilize, and equip churches to collaborate in ministering to both foster care families and children. Working with Administration for Children's Services (ACS) and the Annie E. Casey Foundation, our first step is to identify the areas with the highest concentration of foster care families and children. The second step is to begin bringing churches together in those communities and invite them to explore ways to collaborate and reach the orphans in their neighborhood. FPWA has developed some tools to equip churches for this biblical mandate.
- 4. Marketplace Solutions & Partnership: NY CityServe will convene training together with Partners Worldwide and the Kern Family Foundation to catalyze church-connected partnerships with business owners and corporations around jobs creation for those living in high-poverty neighborhoods, homeless, and those coming out of prison to name a few.
- 5. Ministry Mapping: Using the information we gather from our 300 partners we will begin to map what God is doing in NYC. Specifically we will explore the possibility of creating an online tool for everyone to use as we seek to accelerate the flow of information to churches, ministry organizations, and other stakeholders. Currently we are in dialogue with RedRing about how this might be developed.
- 6. NY CityServe Structure: Organize NY CityServe Leadership Team for a post-festival and LPA fiscal conduit reality. Specifically, NY CityServe will organize the Leadership Team towards alignment to the neighborhood collaborations, and for an increased role in oversight and management. It will continue under the fiscal umbrella through December 31, 2015 and then go under a local fiscal conduit. LPA, NY CityServe Director, and the Leadership Team are all working together on a plan to implement in phases beginning this September.
- **7. Grants:** Assess grant distribution and process. Align if necessary to the long term goals of NY CityServe.

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NY CITYSERVE FUNDING GUIDELINES

Funding priorities for NY CityServe are church-connected, neighborhood-focused ministry efforts in the areas of justice, mercy, and education. Funding for collaborative efforts will average between \$3,500.00 and \$7,500.00 with no funding of more than \$15,000.00 being allocated to a particular request. NY CityServe will not fund more than 40% of the cost of the project being funded or give 100% of the funding to one group in the collaboration to implement the effort. Groups can be part of multiple collaborations but cannot be fiscal conduits of multiple collaborations.

It's highly recommended that the fiscal conduit for any collaborative effort be a church and not a parachurch ministry. NY CityServe strongly recommends that if a parachurch organization is being paid for any contribution it is making to the collaborative effort, the payment should come from the church that is the fiscal manager for the collaborative. If the collaborative is being led by a group of parachurch ministries they must show how the effort is church-connected in very concrete ways. Priority will be given to church-connected, neighborhood collaborations.

Please read the NY CityServe mission and values statement below before applying for any funding. Funds will be made available to those efforts that align with the NY CityServe mission and values statement. INTERNAL GUIDELINES:

- Usually will not fund anything exceeding 40% of the cost of the effort
- Will not have 100 percent of funds be allocated to one group in the collaborative.
- Nobody votes on anything they will benefit from financially.
- Groups can be part of multiple collaborations but not as the fiscal conduit.
- Groups unknown to the borough or focus area leaders would go through an introduction process before they receive the funding application from the borough or focus area leaders.
- Funding applications will be given to groups that align with NY CityServe mission and values. Applications will be reviewed by the appropriate borough focused area leader unless the director knows them.
- Once an application is submitted, the director will determine the appropriate individuals for review, and make recommendations to the full group for funding. The review committee will always consist of a CityServe Co-chair, CityServe Director, Borough Leader, Focus Area Leader and a Citywide Leader.

PROCESS:

- Borough and focus area leaders will send out funding applications.
- If anyone inquires about funding they will be referred to the borough or focus leader for vetting before receiving an application.

Applications will be sent to the NY CityServe director who will send to the appropriate review group to decide about funding the request.


